- Please forgive any mispronounced Spanish words...


A few facts about Ecuador

- It's a small country (about the same size as Arizona)¹
- ...but is "packed with 1640 bird species" (1,683 with Galapagos)²
- Has 109 major ecosystems ranging from Humid Forests to Coastal Wetlands to Montane Andean Forest²
- Population in 2023 was 17.9m, with 2.9m in the metropolitan Quito area³
- Economy reliant on Ag. Production and oil exports³
- Per-capita GDP in 2023 was \$6,691³
- U.S. Currency is used...
- Unfortunately, there has, and continues to be habitat degradation²













































Diversity of Hummingbirds in Ecuador is Amazing

- At least 132 species (or 40% or the world's hummingbirds)¹
- Of 88 listed on our trip Species Guide, I checked off 44²
- Grouping nomenclature³ is joyful. To name a handful there are:
 - Hermits (Large and Small), Fairies, Metaltails, Thornbills, and Montaine
 - Sunangels, Thorntails, Coquettes, Coronets, Pufflegs, Incas and Starfrontlets
 - Whitetips, Brilliants, Woodstars, Emeralds, Sabrewings, and Woodnymphs
 - Amazillas, Sapphires, Violetears, and Topazes








Double-toothed Kite *Harpagus bidentatus*
